Medium Term Expenditure Framework Circular 2017-18

1. Background and Introduction

- 1.1 The Fiscal Responsibility and Budget Management Act, 2003 (Act, henceforth) provides a legislative framework to ensure inter-generational equity in fiscal management and impart long-term macro-economic stability of the country. The Act envisages limiting Central Government borrowing, debts and deficits and aims at increasing transparency in the conduct of fiscal operations of the Central Government. The FRBM framework provides a medium-term perspective for fiscal management by laying out a fiscal road map. It requires the Government to place a medium term fiscal framework laying down the projected fiscal aggregates to meet the fiscal targets as prescribed in the Act/Rules. It also mandates the Government to spell out the strategy that it decides to adopt to meet the projected fiscal plan.
- 1.2 The Medium Term Fiscal Framework plays a crucial role in laying down the medium term and long term fiscal policy of the Government. It provides a credible roadmap for the intention of the Government to contain the deficit to predefined levels. It would also act as an effective reference point for preparation of next budget. Since it is a rolling target, it adapts to the changes in overall macroeconomic conditions. An effective medium term fiscal plan is one that is tightly integrated with the budget and one which provides a credible foundation for the upcoming budgets.
- 1.3 Section 3(d) of the Act, enjoins the Central Government to lay the Medium Term Expenditure Framework (MTEF) Statement before both the houses of Parliament. It has to be laid before Parliament during the session immediately following the session of Parliament in which the budget has been presented (Section 3 (1B)). The FRBM rules as amended in 2013 provides a format in which the Government will lay the MTEF Statement (Form F4 under Rule 4 of the FRBM Rules).
- 1.4 The MTEF is a vertical expansion of the aggregates of the expenditure projections in the fiscal framework presented along with the Annual Financial Statement and the Demand for Grants. The Act envisages that the MTEF Statement shall set forth a three year rolling targets for the prescribed expenditure indicators with the clear indication of underlying assumptions involved (Section 3(6A) (a) of the Act).

1.5 For the preparation of the MTEF Statement Ministries/Departments are required to asses/review their requirement over the medium term (next two financial years) in respect of expenditure commitments on major policy changes, new schemes/programs, salaries (including Grants-in-Aid for salaries), pensions, grants-in-aid for creation of capital assets, interest payments, defence expenditure, major subsidies and other commitments.

2. MTEF Preparation

- 2.1 Beginning 2016-17, an additional statement giving demand-wise revenue-capital break up of expenditure over medium-term was also laid before Parliament as an Annex to the MTEF. To prioritise the expenditure of the Government in the medium-term and to improve the medium-term planning by the line Ministries/Departments, expenditure projections in respect of major schemes/programs of the Government (see Annexe-I) shall be presented along with the MTEF Statement. These schemes have been chosen in consultation with the Department of Expenditure, Ministry of Finance.
- 2.2 Methodology followed for preparation of MTEF Statement is as under:

Methodology:

Stage-I:

- a) In the first stage the Ministries/Departments shall provide demand-wise projections of total revenue and total capital expenditure for the two projection years (FY 2018-19 and 2019-20) on net_basis. Ministries/Departments are required to submit requisite information in respect of MTEF projections online in the MTEF module of the UBIS developed by NIC for this purpose. While making the expenditure projections, the Ministries/ Departments may restrict themselves to a normative expenditure growth of 5-7% over the previous year's allocations/projections subject to their actual requirement. While preparing the estimates care must be taken to first budget for all committed and continuing expenditure, before including provisions for new schemes/items of expenditure. The Ministries/Departments whose schemes/programs are mentioned in the Annexe-I of this circular are also required to submit year-wise expenditure projections, for the indicated major schemes within the overall expenditure projections of the concerned demand.
- b) The Ministries/Departments shall give adequate justification for any increase sought in the Budget for any of its schemes/items of new expenditure. In case, where extra-normal increase (>7%) is sought, Ministry/Department is required to indicate extra revenue generation/matching savings to meet the additionality sought. The reasons may be provided in the Remarks column provided in the MTEF Module.

- c) The Budget Division will work out expenditure projections for each demand and selected schemes/programs (within the overall ceiling of the concerned demand), based on the data filled out by the Ministry/Department in the MTEF Module. It may be mentioned that the expenditure projections worked out by the Budget Division will be co-integrated with the Budget of the Ministry/Department and the Medium Term Fiscal Framework for the whole economy that was presented along with the Union Budget in 2017-18.
- d) 20th June 2017 shall be the deadline for completing Stage I.

Stage-II

In this stage, the demand-wise and selected scheme wise revenue/capital expenditure projections approved by the Finance Ministry will be communicated through MTEF module of UBIS. The Ministries/Departments will be required to fill expenditure details in SBE format within the approved projections. This data would also be used during the RE discussions to finalise the allocations for the ensuing year.

- 3. The URL address for submission of inputs is http://10.22.86.86/ubis/UBIS/Default.aspx. The user id and password will be same as used for the purpose of Budget 2017-18. In case of any difficulty/clarification regarding submission of inputs the concerned Under Secretary/Deputy Director in Budget Division, DEA handling demands of the Ministry/Department may be contacted. In view of time bound nature of work, it is reiterated that, Ministries/Departments shall strictly adhere to cutoff date for submission of inputs. This circular may also be accessed at the DEA's website (www.dea.gov.in) and MTEF module of UBIS.
